*Celebrating the return of Cornish choughs*

*Welcome to the first edition of 'Paloresow Kernewek' (Cornish Choughs), a newsletter about Cornwall's special bird, the chough. This is the 10th year that wild choughs have bred in Cornwall following their historic and natural return in 2001. Read on for the latest news on Cornwall's choughs, and how people far and wide are taking action for them.*

## *Has 2011 been a good year for choughs?*

**Yes it has! This year has been significant for choughs and their best breeding season so far!**

### **The Lizard**

The Southerly Point pair raised two male and two female chicks this year, making a total of 40 chicks safely fledged from that famous sea cave. What a pioneering pair they are! This year's brood is doing well, the family are spending most of their time feeding on the west coast with sightings of them as far as Rinsey. Another Lizard pair fledged a brood of two female and one male chick. Having found their wings, this family, though initially hard to track down, has been seen on the east coast of the Lizard and feeding on the west coast around Predannack.

### **Penwith**

The pair from the Botallack area successfully fledged five chicks, including one female, their fourth brood since 2008. The fledglings were very confident from the start, treating the local gulls and even the peregrines with less respect than they ought.

The great news is there is another breeding pair of choughs in Penwith. This young pair, model parents, had three male chicks, all of which are thriving and often seen around Land's End.



There was a fifth breeding attempt this year by a pair of young choughs who have headed to the north coast of Cornwall. Sadly, their nest was predated by ravens and unfortunately they did not attempt again.

## *Have you seen a chough?*

If you see rings on their legs, please let us know the colour combinations per leg, as this helps us identify that individual bird. ## Local action for choughs

Thanks to a grant from the Cornwall Development Company's Local Action Group and the Tanner Trust, the Cornwall Chough Project has been able to develop new work including an annual events programme and an exciting education programme in West Cornwall. We are running chough clubs in two schools with the aim of expanding this to six by March 2012. The Chough Clubs use enquiry based learning techniques to teach children about their natural environment and their relationship to it. Choughs make a fantastic focal point for their enquiry.
